## Women’s Ministry

Kenneth Glen Knoll (72) was born May 14, 1946, in New Auburn, Wisconsin, and died November 29, 2018, in Springfield, Oregon, surrounded by family.



Ken graduated from Midwest Bible College in Stanberry, Missouri, with a degree in pastoral ministry. He married Mary Jean Wilson on June 15, 1969, in Conroe, Texas. They have two daughters, Carla and Kristen (Kristi).

During his almost fifty years of ministry, Ken pastored churches in Texas, Oklahoma, and Oregon. He retired from the Eugene Church of God (Seventh Day) in January 2014. However, he continued to be actively involved in the Church both locally and nationally, as well as with the Eugene One Hope Network of pastors and churches.

Ken was passionate about his family, his friends, and his God. He will be remembered for his humor, his smile, his love of life, his unconditional love for others, and his total commitment to sharing the love of Jesus. ## Women in Mission

Hundreds of women from different parts of Mexico and other countries met November 29 - December 2 at the Reflect Krystal Grand Hotel at the Nayarit Riviera to celebrate their long-awaited national congress.

Jocheved Martínez welcomed attendees from the seventeen districts of Mexico, as well as sisters from the United States (Texas, California, Michigan, Colorado, Maryland, Florida, New Mexico, South Dakota, and Illinois), Guatemala, Belize, Peru, and Argentina. A total of 930 sisters registered for the event.

The service began early on Friday, November 30, with prayer for the mission to continue spreading throughout the world. That evening the women enjoyed a special program and listened to the plenary session, "The Power of the Holy Spirit in the Mission," presented by Jocheved Martínez. Three videos were presented from Miriam Morales (SHINE), Ruth Carreño (Uruguay), and Brenda Berenice Morales (Argentina) on how they carry out the mission in different countries.

The program continued on December 1 with prayer for missionaries and four workshops. God gave a spiritual nudge through these speakers. The evening service included Min. Israel Delgado, president of the General Executive Council in Mexico. Over sixty women were recognized for their work in the mission and inspiration to others. Special recognition was given to Bertha Elizabeth Esparza (wife of Raúl López, who sleeps in the Lord) and Susana Reyes (wife of Abraham Valdovinos, who sleeps in the Lord).

Alicia Miranda spoke on "The Mission, Action of Love," then extended a moving call to women who wanted to be baptized. Afterward, Brother Israel Delgado delivered an emotional message and concluded with a restoration prayer for all women. The evening concluded with a parade of regional costumes, with

all the states of the Mexican Republic present. Women also paraded representing the United States, Guatemala, El Salvador, Belize, as well as India and Africa.

On December 2, prayer was held at the sea, with the baptism of four sisters who made a covenant of love with God. Hundreds of women prayed and wept in this blessed event, officiated by Min. Delgado. Eva Delgado-Alonso gave the closing message on "Women in Mission" and challenged the sisters to share the light of God wherever they are. After the closing prayer by Israel Delgado, the women concluded by singing "To God Be the Glory" — praise for His love covering this magnificent event.

## Visiting CoG7 in Rome

For over ten years, I earnestly desired to travel to Europe. By the grace of God, an opportunity made this dream come true. I would, however, be faced with the challenge of traveling overseas on my own. With high hopes and some fears, I booked my solo trip to Rome, Italy, in November.

With Bryan Cleeton's help, I located the nearest CoG7, an hour away from Rome. Although I took two buses and one tram to get there, the destination was more than worth it! There is something about sharing the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ that breaks all barriers. The service was in Italian and Romanian, but I was blessed with the support from two sisters, Jennifer Agneta Pop and Mara Armenean, who knew enough English to translate the message and conversations. This transformed a group of "strangers" who don't speak the same language into family!

After the service, we went to Pastor Daniel's home for a potluck, and experienced firsthand the warmth and generosity from our brethren in Italy. The congregation in Rome mainly consists of brethren originally from Romania. They gather at a small location (garage), where they have met for about fifteen years. Unfortunately, the congregation loses members from time to time, as people return to Romania due to lack of employment in Italy. The brethren who remain in Rome drive an hour or so to get to their church.

I found so much encouragement in visiting the church as much as they did from my visit, and I promised I would send their greetings as well as lift them in prayer. Please keep Pastor Daniel and the congregation in your prayers.

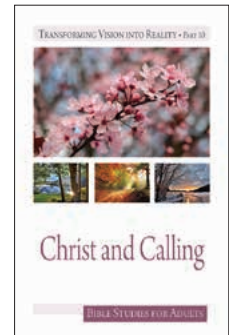

## Adult Second Quarter Lessons

*Christ and Calling* focuses on the biblical basis of being disciples of Christ. The necessary attitude, commitment, and enduring faith that mark out a disciple of Jesus is explored throughout.

In a general sense, we are all called to be disciples, and then to make disciples of others. But to engage in this work effectively, we must first be disciples ourselves. A disciple of Christ is involved in a process of inner transformation accomplished by God, but that process requires our willingness and submission to be discipled by Him.

Becoming Christ's disciple mandates a personal desire to be encouraged, corrected, and ultimately transformed into the very image of Jesus Christ. This quarterly discusses the challenge of discipleship and the results it produces.



## Children's Curriculum (March-May)

**Intermediate.** In *The Armor of God*, students will learn why Jesus needed to come to earth to pay for humanity's sins. Those who commit their lives to Christ and accept Him as their Lord and Savior learn that Satan is their enemy. Therefore, they must put on the armor of God to protect against the spiritual warfare Satan directs against them. Lessons also cover Paul's admonition to put on the whole armor of God (Ephesians 6:10-20).




**Primary.** *Blessing – God Blessing Us and Using Us to Bless Others* teaches students that God has many blessings He longs to give to each of us. As we read His Word, we better understand some of these blessings and how we can receive them and then share them with others. These lessons focus on the stories in Genesis and Exodus, continuing where last quarter left off — from Joseph in Egypt to the Israelites building the tabernacle in the wilderness.



**Preschool/kindergarten.** *God's Power in Us* introduces students to characters in the Bible just before, during, and after the Babylonian captivity. Students will learn how God used many different people in different situations to show His power and glory. Students will also learn that God can use us, too, if we let Him.

Our Biennial Convention will be here before you know it! Reduce your stress level now – check out this quick guide to what's coming up in Albuquerque and how you can prepare for it.

## Hotels

Two Albuquerque hotels have been chosen for our convention. This information will help you make the best choice for you and your family.

### DoubleTree

The beautiful DoubleTree Hotel is right across the street from the Convention Center, where most of our meetings and events will be held. An underground tunnel to the Convention Center lets you go back and forth without ever going outside! The DoubleTree has a coffee bar, café, and restaurant. The sleeping rooms are nice but not spacious. If staying close to the action and walking/driving as little as possible are your priorities, the DoubleTree is for you. Cost per night: \$119, plus tax.



each evening. There is also a full-service restaurant and coffee bar. Cost per night: \$119, plus tax, for one or two adults; \$129 for three or four adults, plus tax. (Children are free with an adult.)

## Albuquerque Convention Center

The modern Albuquerque Convention Center has ample space to accommodate all events: children, youth, and SWORD activities; workshops, meals, business sessions, and worship services. The Kiva Auditorium, with seating for 2,300, is a bonus in a facility that already meets our needs. Can you imagine our evening worship services in this beautiful auditorium — voices singing praise to Jesus, our Lord and Savior, and evening speakers challenging us to more intentional Christian living? Worshipping together is such a blessed event.

There's even more. Outside the Convention Center is a large Civic Plaza that hosts a variety of outdoor activities throughout the year. Knowing how our attendees enjoy visiting with each other, the Plaza will probably be a popular spot.

Let's meet at the Albuquerque Convention Center in July!

### Embassy Suites

The Embassy Suites is also beautiful. (Ask your pastor. It was the site of the 2018 Ministerial Council meeting.) Unfortunately, it is located almost a mile from the Convention Center. Those who stay in this hotel need to drive or take a shuttle to get back and forth. *Parking is free at this hotel only.*



So why would anyone choose Embassy Suites? Because each room is a suite with a separate bedroom, living room, and kitchenette. Included in the per-night cost is a wonderful breakfast each morning and a snack, which might serve as a light dinner

## Registration and Reservations



In order to attend and participate in our 2019 Convention, you must do two things.

First, register for the convention itself by completing the registration forms and paying the appropriate fees online ([cog7.org/convention](http://cog7.org/convention)). If you can't do this yourself, please have someone help you. You may call "Linda K" at our Denver office (303-452-7973) during business hours for assistance.

Second, reserve a room at the convention hotel you prefer, using the link provided on our convention website. If you wish to participate in a pre-convention tour on Monday, July 1, make sure to check in to your hotel on Sunday, June 30. Otherwise, check in on Monday, July 1, and out on Sunday, July 7, to attend the entire convention.

## Dollars and Sense

How are conventions paid for?



You may be surprised that every two years, we do our best to ensure that our biennial conventions pay for themselves. This is more difficult than you may imagine. Those who attend pay for their own hotel rooms, sure, but there is so much more to cover. Hotel/Convention Center meeting rooms, auditoriums, audio/visual equipment, security personnel, group meals, special meals, parking, Wi-Fi, video streaming are all extremely expensive. Add to these the expenses of special programs for children, teens, young adults, and senior adults, as well as the costs of printing registration forms and voting information (nominees, amendments, committee reports) and of renting voting equipment. Don't forget transportation costs to bring equipment and materials to the convention from our Denver offices!

These and other expenses are largely paid for by attendees. Our registration and facility fees, offerings, purchases of meal tickets, and contract credits we receive for staying in the convention hotels usually help us break even financially.

You can help! Attend. Participate. Stay in a convention hotel. Buy meal tickets. Pay the registration fee. If we each do our part, we can save our church a lot of money.

## Why stay in a convention hotel?

Each convention, we negotiate the best possible nightly room rate with one or more hotels needed to house attendees and conduct our meetings. In most cases, the more convention hotel rooms we occupy per night, the less we are charged for meeting rooms and services. If, on the other hand, we fail to occupy the number of hotel rooms per night agreed upon in our contract, we must pay the difference, which can be substantial — tens of thousands of dollars! For this reason, there is an additional **Facility Fee** charged to those who do not stay in a convention hotel.

One could find a budget motel near our convention that costs a few dollars less per night than a convention hotel. But the relatively few dollars saved per night can cost our church thousands! That's why booking at one of our convention hotels is so important.

Or maybe you want to do something else in this

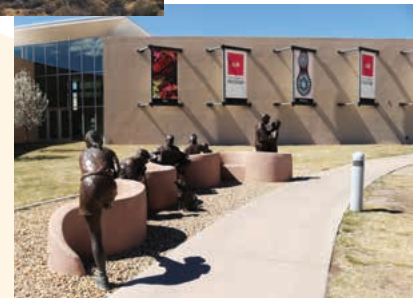
southwestern state. If previously you've wished for more time to explore the locations of our G. C. conventions, this is the place to do it. And if you'll be flying into Albuquerque and have no car available, there is good news! Most of the tours (through Tour New Mexico) provide ground transportation.

On Monday, July 1, and Friday afternoon, July 5, attendees can join other friends and family in exploring the local historical, cultural, and recreational attractions. Be sure to check out the "Tours" section of the convention website for a list of tours you can



enjoy during the week. In addition to hot air balloon rides, choose from a tram ride on the second longest aerial tramway of its

kind in the world, Old Town Albuquerque, Santa Fe, and museums (Turquoise Museum, National Hispanic Cultural



Center, or Albuquerque International Balloon Museum). Or visit the Albuquerque BioPark (aquarium, botanic garden, and nearby zoo).
